Revenue Purpose Statement

The Jesup School District has been hard at work over the past year and a half in developing a Long Range Facility Plan. Through input from various stakeholders and committees, a comprehensive review of our current facilities and grounds, and a thorough design process, we have developed a three phase plan for the renovation and expansion of our district facilities. We are currently working through Phase One and expect to have a majority of those projects completed this fall. Phase One projects are being completed with existing revenue sources (carryover funds from years past). As we look forward to completing Phase Two and Phase Three, the district will need to secure additional revenues. The complete Long Range Facility Plan can be found on the district website at https://www.jesup.k12.ia.us/district/long-range-facility-plan.aspx

One critical piece in order to complete this work is being able to borrow against future State Sales Tax funds. Last year, the Iowa Legislature approved the extension of these funds through 2049. In order for a school to potentially borrow against and access these funds, a district must update their Revenue Purpose Statement. We have scheduled a public vote to extend this statement on **Tuesday**, **March 2nd**. A copy of the ballot language and polling information is included in this newsletter. Polls will be open from **7 a.m. to 8 p.m.** on this day. All residents of the Jesup Community School District are eligible and encouraged to vote. Those residing in the Jesup Precinct will vote at Jesup City Hall. Those residing in the Perry/Westburg/Fairbanks Townships will vote at the First United Methodist Church and those residing in Brandon will vote at the Brandon Community Center.

It is important to note, that this vote **IS NOT** a tax increase. The Statewide Sales Tax is already in place and will be collected regardless of the outcome of the vote. This vote is only an extension of our current Revenue Purpose Statement, but is critical for the district to be able to access and utilize these funds past 2029. Access to these funds will allow us to use these existing revenues to continue our facilities work as we proceed through the rest of our Long Range Facility Plan. In closing, please mark your calendars for **March 2nd** and get out and vote any time between **7 a.m. and 8 p.m.** at your respective polling locations.

2021 Special Election

Jesup Community School District will hold a special election on March 2, 2021 to adopt a Revenue Purpose Statement specifying the use of revenues the school district will receive from the State of Iowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund.

Absentee Ballots for Buchanan County voters residing in the Jesup Community School District are now available at the Buchanan County Auditor's Office, 210 5th Avenue NE, Independence IA 50644. Ballots may be voted there 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM, Monday-Friday, through Monday, March 1. To vote by mail, send an absentee ballot request form (found at www.buchanancounty.iowa.gov) to the Auditor's Office at the above address and a ballot will be mailed to you. Absentee ballot request forms must be received in the Auditor's Office by the deadline of 5:00 PM, Friday, February 19, or no ballot will be mailed.

The polls will be open from 7:00 AM until 8:00 PM on Election Day, March 2nd. Voting is limited to those Buchanan County voters that reside in the Jesup Community School District. Voters in Jesup Precinct will vote at Jesup City Hall, 791 6th Street, Jesup. Voters Perry/Westburg townships and voters Fairbank Township that are in Jesup School District will vote at First United Methodist Church, 455 6th Street, Jesup. Brandon residents in Jesup School District will vote at Brandon Community Center, 804 Main Street, Brandon.

Voter Pre-Registration Deadline: The last day to pre-register at the Auditor's Office for this election is Friday, February 19 before 5:00 PM. Voter registration forms may be found at www.sos.iowa.gov or www.buchanancounty.iowa.gov. Following the deadline and on Election Day, any new voter and any voter who has moved from outside the county will be processed using the requirements of Election Day Registration and must provide proof of residence and identity.

Summary: To adopt a Revenue Purpose Statement specifying the use of revenues the Jesup Community School District will receive from the State of lowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund.

In the Jesup Community School District, the following Revenue Purpose Statement which specifies the use of revenues the Jesup Community School District will receive from the State of lowa Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund shall be adopted.

To provide funds to acquire or install information technology infrastructure (including improving buildings or sites for the purpose of accessing broadband digital telecommunications) and school safety and security intrastructure.

To provide funds to build and furnish a new school building or buildings; to build and furnish addition(s) to school buildings in the District; to remodel, reconstruct, repair, expand, and improve the school buildings in the District; to purchase and improve grounds; for demolition work; to furnish and equip district facilities.

To provide funds for the purchase, lease or lease-purchase of buildings, equipment (including transportation and recreation equipment), or technology and to repair transportation equipment for transporting students as authorized by law, to implement eriergy conservation measures, sharing or rental of facilities including a joint infrastructure project for the purposes of offering classes under a district-to-community college as authorized in lowa Code Section 423F.3(3)(c), procuring or acquisition of libraries, or opening roads to schoolhouses or buildings.

To provide funds to purchase land as part of start-up costs for new student construction program or if the sale of the previous student construction was insufficient to purchase land, and to purchase construction materials and supplies for a studentconstructed building or shed intended to be retained by and used by the District.

To provide funds to make payments to a municipality or other entity as required under lowa Code Section 403,19(2).

To provide funds for demolition, cleanup, and other costs if such costs are necessitated by, and incurred within two years of, a disaster.

To provide funds to establish and maintain public recreation places and playgrounds; provide for supervision and instruction for recreational activities; or for community education purposes.

To provide funds for the payment of principal and interest or retirement of general obligation bonds issued for school infrastructure purposes, energy improvement loans, loan agreements authorized by lowa Code Section 297.36, sales, service and use tax revenue bonds issued under lowa Code Section 423E.5 or lowa Code Section 423F.4.

To provide funds for property tax relief; and

To provide funds for other authorized expenditures and purposes as now or hereafter permitted by law and designated by the Jesup Community School District.

It being understood that if this proposition should fail to be approved by the voters, such failure shall not be construed to terminate or restrict authority previously granted by the voters to expend receipts from the Secure an Advanced Vision for Education Fund.

if approved, this Revenue Purpose Statement shall remain in effect until replaced or amended by the Jesup Community School District.

Things to do on these cold COLD days at home:





Why Calculators and Computers? Krista Casillas High School Math

Several of the high school mathematics classes have been working heavily with graphing calculators over the last couple of weeks. Algebra 2 has been focused on modeling applications with polynomials and looking at turning points and end behaviors. So many things in the world can be modeled using mathematics and the use of technology can make this process quicker and more efficient.

In elementary school students use flash cards to memorize quick facts, these are not what we are picking up the calculators and computers for in high school. When calculations become long and cumbersome, computers can speed up our work significantly. Graphing by hand is an important skill, but for a quick peek at the graph of a polynomial, a computer can open up a world of information in a few seconds.



Occasionally, there is a bit of troubleshooting that needs to be done when working with technology. The errors can usually be attributed to user input and are often great moments in our learning. I think we can all agree that technology is not going away any time soon.

After several investigations of polynomials, students no longer ask why they need a graphing tool in my class as there are not many that would spend the time graphing something so complex out by hand when the have the power available to them in a handheld device.



Amazing benefits of Audiobooks





When was the last time you listened to an exciting story or book? I frequently listen to audiobooks while traveling, doing chores, and with students at school. During the first semester, the Vocational English students and I listened to an audiobook: "The Tiger Rising" by Kate DiCamillo. The voice of the narrator helped engage the students as they read with the audio. The audio added value to the reading experience by shifting the focus from decoding words to understanding and enjoying the story. While listening to audiobooks, students engage in thinking about the content, using their imagination and making connections. **Audiobooks are a wonderful option in providing access to literature and can benefit all students.**

Denise Johnson, assistant professor of reading education at the College of William & Mary in Virginia, summarized the benefits of audiobooks for all readers well with:

"Audiobooks can be used to:

- Introduce students to books above their reading level
- Model good interpretive reading
- Teach critical listening
- Highlight the humor in books
- Introduce new genres that students might not otherwise consider
- Introduce new vocabulary or difficult proper names or locales
- Sidestep unfamiliar dialects or accents, Old English, and old-fashioned literary styles
- Provide a read-aloud model
- Provide a bridge to important topics of discussion for parents and children who can listen together while commuting to sporting events, music lessons, or on vacations
- Recapture "the essence and the delights of hearing stories beautifully told by extraordinarily talented storytellers" (Baskin & Harris, 1995, p. 376)"

Access to audiobooks is now easier than ever. Audio CDs are still available, but listening to audiobooks on electronics has become more popular. Some well-liked audiobook subscription services are Audible, Google Audiobooks, and Kobo Audiobooks. These providers do cost money. As an alternative, Librivox has free public domain audiobooks available at https://librivox.org/. Furthermore, your local library can lend you audiobook CDs and can give you free access to Bridges, an online platform.

https://bridges.overdrive.com/. Bridges is a statewide association of libraries that provides the people of Iowa with thousands of audiobook and ebook titles for free. Audiobooks are a welcome addition to the classroom and personal reading experience. A library card will give access to audiobooks for free. Listening or reading text increases the exposure to words and ideas; this fosters the students' academic growth. Audiobooks enrich the reading experience.

Unseen Strategies by Teachers By: Kurt Yeoman

While researching information over Christmas vacation, for my classroom, I stumbled upon this article that has a very powerful message. That message is demonstrated daily by the saying 'Jesup Strong'. Academics is not the only thing teachers do in the classroom. Teachers build relationships and rapport with students that ultimately creates trust within and out of the classroom. Below are just a few ways that I wanted to share with everyone of how this actually happens. Through these strategies bonds are built and relationships are formed!

- Greetings and salutations. There is a profound power in the word "hello." Find a way to show sincere joy when your students arrive. Whether it's a fist bump, a high five, a secret handshake, or a simple "hi," greetings and salutations go a long way to show your students you care.
- Talk to your students. In the hustle and bustle of the teaching day, build in intentional time to sit and just talk to your students with disabilities. Even when you feel the pressure to get back to academics, feel confident that two minutes talking to a child about what they are interested in will produce larger dividends in productive, academic work than you may imagine.
- Model risk taking and vulnerability. It is challenging for students to work outside their comfort zones. However, if they see that you are willing to take chances yourself, students believe they can do it too. I take time to talk about my failures. I share stories about my family. I explain the challenges I had when I was in school. I try new strategies in my classroom and let the students know that I could use their help in "tweaking" it if it doesn't go well. Modeling risk taking and vulnerability builds trust.
- Set clear expectations. For some students with disabilities, school is a mystical puzzle that can be very confusing. A huge piece to your relationship with your students stems from their confidence in knowing what they are supposed to learn. Taking time to communicate clear and attainable targets for students with disabilities allows them to set out on the journey of learning with you. Learning targets are a trust builder.
- Encourage failure. Students with disabilities benefit from seeing that failure is valued as a learning experience. I use the phrases "Learning is a Journey" and "Epic F.A.I.L.s" in my classroom to encourage this culture. We are all at a different place on our learning journey and it is our First Attempts In Learning that give us the feedback we need for success!
- Establish a specific praise and gratitude routine. Scheduling intentional time for praise is crucial to building relationships. In order to hear your feedback, students need to trust that you see their successes as well. Consider creating one day a week that you send positive emails home highlighting specific examples of student success. In addition, when students check in with you about their work, start with something specific that the student was successful with in relationship to the learning target before providing feedback for improvement. For a student to value this praise, avoid simply giving generic praise such as "Good job!". To build relationships, students appreciate that you saw the unique and specific strategies that they personally utilized. Have your students express and reflect as a class-wide social-emotional practice using the strategy Gratitude Sharing & Reflecting.
- Be aware of your tone and body language. Body language and tone convey a clear message to students. Students are very perceptive; they will feel frustration if they sense your own. To build a relationship founded on trust, I have found that students need to feel patience and understanding that is conveyed by your body language and tone. Students also value being able to share their emotions and hear your emotions and feelings.

Forming connections with students is essential for the success of all students, not just students with disabilities. The students that enter our classrooms all have the ability to grow and learn. It is up to us to create intentional moments that allow us to see the inspiration they can provide.

Students need to see teachers as someone they can trust with their mistakes. They need to feel that I will see their greatness amidst their struggle. Teachers are builders of relationships.


