

While this past year has been a struggle and we are not "out of the woods" yet, things seem to be improving each day and week. It is our expectation that come fall with the start of the 2021-22 school year, we will return to school in a fairly normal way. While as I have shared numerous times over the past 13+ months, that guidance changes frequently and we will do our best to be responsive as these changes occur, I am hopeful for this return to prepandemic schooling.

Before I share any specific updates on what to expect this summer into next fall at Jesup CSD, I think it is important to say thank you to each and every one of you for your dedication, patience, innovation, and flexibility through this past year. Students, thank you for rolling with the punches, being open to learning in new ways, being thoughtful and careful in following safety protocols in order to provide the safest learning environment for both yourself and each other. Teachers, thank you for demonstrating that life-long learning never ends and that teaching and learning can look many different ways. The countless hours you have committed and the flexibility and compassion you demonstrated each day to ensure our students continued to progress in the learning will show its value in years to come. All of the Jesup support staff, thank you for bearing with us through so many unknowns this year and stepping up to help wherever and whenever needed. New sanitation procedures, delivering hot meals, working one on one with a student as they returned from an extended absence of learning, driving a school bus with a mask on, answering phone calls and providing the front line of communications with parents, all of your efforts are appreciated and critical to our work as a school. As we close out this school year, the building principals are working with their staff members to put together a diverse offering of summer school activities Thanks to federal ESSER funds, these extended academic opportunities will be available at no additional cost. Also, at this time, it is our intention to only offer in-person learning for the 2021-22 school year. We believe strongly that the most effective learning takes place in a face to face setting. While we have learned many new tools on how to improve our teaching and learning, and we expect many of those new practices to continue, we do not plan to offer virtual or hybrid learning options next year. Lastly, we have fielded some questions in regards to the mask requirement. With required quarantining restrictions still in place, we will continue to require masks for the remainder of this school year. As more and more individuals are vaccinated and COVID numbers continue to decrease, it is our expectation that quarantine requirements will be lifted prior to the start of the 2021-22 school year and masks will no longer be required.

As the daylight lasts longer, the weather gets warmer, and flowers bloom, the anticipation of summer starts drawing near! I am excited about summer like everyone else; however I am also looking forward to caring for your children next year! Becoming the school nurse during the pandemic has only made me feel more fortunate to be in a role to support our students and families. I would like to personally thank everyone in the community for welcoming me in to the district and for your patience and resilience as this has been another memorable year!

As we head into the summer months, this is a great time to tackle the health requirements for the 2021-2022 school year. Please see the following State of Iowa Health requirements and announcements listed by grade level. As always, feel free to reach out by phone or email with any questions or if you need copies of any forms.

Attention Graduating Class of 2021 and Parents/ Guardians

Immunization reports for our graduating seniors will be sent home with their report cards. This is a permanent document that needs to be kept in a safe place for life. Many businesses and schools are requiring proof of immunizations before being employed or entering school. Please keep this in a safe place for when you need it in the future. Incoming Pre-School, Pre-K and New Students of Any Grade Level- Need Physical Exam & Immunizations

A physical exam is required for preschool, prekindergarten and new students of any grade level. Your doctor can use a form from their office, the attached form, or fax their office note to attn: School Nurse. Please submit a copy of current immunizations.

Incoming Kindergarten Students- Need Lead Screening, Immunizations, Vision & Dental Screening

All children enrolling in Kindergarten are required by State of Iowa Law to have at least one lead test to be in compliance with IAC 641 Chapter 67. This is usually done at their kindergarten physical exam. Kindergarten students are also required to have a vision screen to be in compliance with with IAC 641 Chapter 52. Our local Lions Club will provide a FREE screening at the beginning of the school year if the Kidsight consent is signed. Please submit a certificate of vision screening form. A dental screening exam is also required by State Law in compliance with IDPH 641 Chapter 51. This can be submitted on a certificate of dental screening form and from any dental visit after the age of three to present.

Incoming 3rd Graders – Need a Vision Screening

This vision screening is required by Iowa Code Section 135.39D. This may be done at your physician's office or a more comprehensive exam by an ophthalmologist or optometrist. The purpose of the child vision screening program is to improve the eye health and vision of Iowa's children. Please submit a certificate of vision screening form.

Incoming 7th Graders- Need to Update Immunizations

It's lowa State Law that all students entering 7th grade have both a meningococcal conjugate vaccine (A,C,W,Y) and Tdap BEFORE starting 7th grade. Please schedule him/her to receive this vaccination before the first day of school. If you are unsure if your child has received this, please call your healthcare provider. A certificate of religious or medication exemption must be submitted if your child does not receive vaccinations. A medical exemption certificate must be signed by a physician. A religious exemption certificate must be signed by a notary.

Incoming 9th Graders – Need Dental Screening

All children enrolling in 9th grade are required to have a dental screening pursuant to lowa Department of Public Health 641 Chapter 51. The purpose of the dental screening requirement is to improve the oral health of lowa's children. The screening is valid one year prior to enrollment and may only be performed by a licensed dentist or dental hygienist. This must be submitted on a certificate of dental screening form or exemption form.

Attention Incoming 12th Graders- Need to Update Immunizations

It's lowa State Law that all incoming 12th graders to have a second dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine (A,C,W,Y) vaccine BEFORE starting school, or 1 dose if the first dose was received after the age of sixteen years old. This is different than the meningococcal B vaccine which is not required. Meningococcal disease is a life threatening illness that is caused from bacteria that infects the brain, blood, and spinal cord. It easily spreads in crowded settings (college dorm rooms). Please call your doctor to get your incoming senior updated!

We are currently working on persuasive essays with topics such as: Covid-19, roundabouts, crop-dusting, trespassing, and farm safety. Although it is interesting to hear the different perspectives and opinions through persuasive writing, I wanted to share a unique poem written by one of our students: Rebecca Raber. As we know, comparative thinking is one of our first and most natural forms of thought. Finding likenesses and differences helps students to develop higher-order thinking skills and improve comprehension by highlighting important details. Comparing and contrasting is one of many skills we work on in class. To make this task more uniquely enjoyable and to strengthen our writing skills, we worked on this concept through two-voiced poetry. Creating poetry helps students learn to adapt language choices to purpose, task, and audience when writing and speaking. This type of poetry is usually written in two or three columns so that one person speaks at a time with the middle column being where the two people speak simultaneously.

dent Choice in Read Weepie, 5th Grade Literacy & Languag

This summer I had the opportunity to take a class that was centered around the book "The Book Whisperer" by Donalyn Miller. Miller talks about her experience as a reading teacher, and why she decided to flip how she taught reading after years of experience. The book dives into the importance and effectiveness of giving students a choice in the books they read for class. I was inspired by her research and experience, and decided to try something new this semester!

Since January, fifth grade students have been taking part in monthly Independent Reading Units. Rather than reading a novel together as a whole class, students are able to choose their own book to read. By the end of the month, each student is expected to have finished a book and completed a book report project. Students choose a book report project from a monthly choice board. Each project is designed to assess the student's comprehension of their book, as well as to assess that month's targeted standards & skills. Class time consists of a combination of independent reading time, whole-class mini lessons on that month's targeted standards, and independent work time for them to complete book reports and practice applying the skills we've been focusing on that month.

I have seen so many wonderful benefits since making this change. Check out some of the benefits of incorporating student choice in the classroom in the list below!

I Know You Can't See It, but Under My Mask, I'm Smiling

I have never seen a happier group of 8th graders as I did this past August. Well, that's not entirely true. I THINK they were happy. I couldn't see their smiles because, you know, pandemic. Regardless, their eyes danced, their eyebrows bobbled, and every so often I'd catch them in a good ol' giggle. They were thrilled to be back at school.

Of course, a little of the shine wore off eventually, as it often does for middle schoolers. The day-to-day early waking hours, homework, and classroom workload takes a toll. "Thrilled" wasn't really a good description of my October 8th graders, but they were definitely hanging in there. By then, at least, I could tell they were smiling from the crinkles around their eyes.

After Christmas, we were definitely in the full school swing of things. I'd finally learned to stop making facial expressions that kids couldn't see in the hall. They had learned that masks were also good insulation for cold February mornings. Less and less were there conversations about cancelled events and hand sanitizer. They'd become part of our daily routine, but they were not THE routine. We read, we wrote, we presented, we talked endlessly about the books we were all reading. Our school lives, at least, were basically back to normal.

Now, solidly into April, it's that time of year when someone always mentions how many days remain before we are finished for the summer. Usually those kids counting are practically aching for the heat of summer far away from the demands of the classroom. I noticed this year, however, more and more kids commenting instead about how fast this year has gone. "It was just February last week," one said to me only yesterday. Sure, they're looking forward to fewer responsibilities and less grammar homework, but this school routine has been a solid and steady constant for nearly nine months. We've been fortunate enough to be here, doing the school thing, almost every day all year long, and there is a lot to be said for that.

Someday, hopefully soon, we will get back to the old pre-pandemic normal. It will be a relief to see kids smile at each other again. At the same time, though, this year? These 8th graders listened to each other more closely. They spent more time with small groups of kids that they wouldn't always be inclined to work with. They focused more intently on the people closest to them. They learned to read each other's eyes, not just their words.

Can You "Survive" 6th Grade Literacy?!

Surviving any school year is an accomplishment all on its own, now toss in a pandemic, face masks, virtual learners, and preteens....oofta! I can't believe we made it! I knew after surviving this whole school year thus far, the end-of-the-year survival unit for 6th grade literacy was going to be a breeze!

About five years ago I decided to mix things up with my ending unit in 6th grade literacy. We always ended the year with literature circles to help prepare them for the independent & group literature circles they'd be doing in 7th and 8th grade. I would choose one of my favorite books and we'd all do the same book, work, and test. Not the most fun way to end the year. Even 6th graders get their own "senioritis" at the end of the year; right along with my end-of-the-year teacheritis. I wanted a way to keep them engaged until the end. With the help of a former coworker and the book, Explore Like a Pirate, by Michael Matera we decided to add a little "gamification" to the end of the year while still practicing the same skills and assessing the same standards we needed to. The Survival Unit is what we created.

During the unit, the class completes several survival-themed activities to demonstrate and practice their critical thinking skills and problem-solving abilities. Such activities include scenarios like Survival Island, Lost at Sea, Survival on the Moon, Altoid Survival Box, and many more where they're given the scenario and have to answer one big question or complete one big task. Some of these activities are done individually, some with partners, and some with small groups. Students must demonstrate their ability to think outside the box and also how to work with others to come to a group consensus.

Students also "compete" with one another with a weekly updated leaderboard. This in no way influences their grade but is that game/incentive piece of the unit to keep them engaged. Students earn points for the leaderboard by demonstrating certain "survival skills" inside and outside of the classroom. Every day I take notes in my "survival notebook." I use my notes, results of class activities, and badges to award points to students. I update the leaderboard every Friday after school and then they rush in on Mondays to see it, as I usually only post the current top five, which can change often.

There is always a reward for the top scorers at the end of the unit.

Where's the education part? The novels. At the start of the unit, I have students preview several survival books and choose their top three they'd be interested in reading. I then sort them into five groups. Each group is assigned a different survival novel. Students complete weekly assigned readings and then meet with others reading the same book once a week to share their different assigned jobs that are based on different reading strategies & skills. Their work is turned in at the end to be assessed according to our standards. Last year we were unable to do this unit in its entirety due to us being at home surviving a pandemic. I'm so excited to get back into it full force!

Up, Up and Away!

Recently, the 7th and 8th graders have been working on Newton's Laws. Specifically, Newton's 2nd Law. We have been completing activities in the class that exposed the students to the interaction of force, mass and acceleration or $F = M \ge A$. Students experimented with changing the mass or weight of an object and seeing its effect on the acceleration. Students also studied the effect changing the force has on acceleration. Recently, though, you might have seen my classes outside of the middle school. I gave the students the task of designing an experiment utilizing paper rockets. The rockets are made of a rolled up piece of copy paper and fins made out of cardstock. Many of the students experimented with different numbers of fins on the rockets or different sized fins. We then spent a class outside launching the rockets. I built a launcher out of pvc pipe and used an air compressor to power it. Many students were able to get their rockets to fly over 100 ft. with some going over 200 ft. Not bad for a rocket made of paper.

JCSD School Library Updates-Choice Boards

As the school year began in the fall of 2020, there were many unknowns, and that included how the libraries would be affected. Social distancing, cleaning procedures, quarantining books, and keeping traffic to a minimum were just a few. As we find ourselves making progress against the pandemic, so too are we making progress in the libraries. A few changes were made to accommodate the previously listed precautions and, therefore, changed some offerings.

Most businesses and people were faced making accommodations and became creative in their endeavors to overcome and succeed against any obstacles. So, too, has the library. We found ways to check out books, return books, find books, request books and continue to read to escape to destinations unknown. Reading was one activity we could continue to do throughout the pandemic. It gave us a way to escape the day to day and even live through the characters to go on an adventure, fly into space, do some crime scene investigation or witness a love story. But, in some instances, we found ourselves stuck at home, with no access to those escapes.

Thankfully, ideas were created and shared and posted so students and parents had access to those adventures again. Now we have taken another step towards making adventures accessible to students through the use of Choice Boards. Choice Boards allow students to choose what they want to explore, whether it is Coding, Making, Reading eBooks, Watching videos, Learning about Holidays, Technology, Art or Music; there are many options available.

Choice Boards are a way of providing options for students to explore their interests. So, the libraries have added some Choice Boards to the Library Services pages located off of the Jesup Homepage. These are accessible with an Internet connection and provide a multitude of activities for students to explore, especially over the summer months.

To access the Choice Boards, do the following:

- 3. Choose Library Services from Left Sidebar
- 4. Again, Choose the Collection-Elementary/Middle School or High School
- 5. On the Library Homepage you should see Choice Boards as a Heading. Select a Choice Board to view and click on the link.
